**Aim Questions:**

1. Why did the people make the golden calf? What do you think this shows about the condition of their hearts?
2. What was Aaron's response after Moses confronted him and the nation for their idolatry? Would you have believed him?
3. When Moses prayed to God for the people, what can we learn about his heart for God and for God's people?
4. Why did God desire to remove His presence from the nation? Will God do this today in the lives of His people?
5. What can we learn about the character of God in this passage?
6. What can we learn about intercessory prayer from this passage?

**Hook:**

“Don't Wake Up in the Morning With a Stiff Neck!” (*Skit*). This dialogue between friends and family can be used as a funny skit or puppet presentation to demonstrate the meaning of obstinance or stubbornness. The goal of this is to show that in everyday life we too can be as stubborn as the Israelites. This will be a lead-in to our Bible Adventure this morning, **1EXO09.GF1**.



**These Are a Few of My Favorite Things (Craft)**. Using **EXO09.GF2**, instruct the kids to color and fill in the hearts with things, activities, foods, people, etc., that they absolutely LOVE. Discuss why these are their favorite things. God wants us to LOVE Him more than anything. The Israelites forgot this commandment, and we will see God's response to them in today's Bible Adventure.



**Patience is a Virtue (Game)**. Bring some games or activities from home that require great patience to play. As you play these games, talk about why we feel impatient. We all have a hard time waiting for a response, especially in today's society. We have become so accustomed to having it all immediately. The Israelites were not any different. They could not wait until Moses came back down from the mountain, so they took things into their own hands. Game suggestions might be Labyrinth, pick-up sticks, Jenga, or Blockhead. We all know how difficult it is to share a Gameboy or any other electronic game. What if the teachers brought only two and the entire class had to wait their turn to use them!



### **Commandment Review (Games).**

**1. The Missing Commandment.** Write each commandment on a strip of paper. Using masking tape, post all of these up on the wall. It will work better if they are not in order. Ask the kids to cover their eyes. As they do this, the teacher removes one of the commandments from the wall. When the kids open their eyes, they try to guess which one is missing.

**2. The Commandment Race.** Give each student the Ten Commandments that have been cut into strips and held together with a paper clip. These should not be in order when they are given to the students. When the teacher says GO, the students remove the paper clip and race to put their commandments in order. The first to complete them correctly is the winner. This could be played with the entire class or within the small table groups, which would help some of the younger kids compete within their peer group.

**Bible Adventure Attention Grabber (Demonstration).** Make commandment tablets out of plaster or unfired clay (a material that will shatter easily). As you describe the portion of the Bible Adventure where Moses comes down from the mountain with the tablets, you can throw these to the floor, smashing them right in front of their eyes. If any student is not paying attention, this ought to redirect their focus!

#### **Bible Adventure –**

Last time, we learned of God's meeting with Moses on Mount Sinai, and how God gave His servant very detailed instructions on the building of the tabernacle where God would dwell among His people. We imagined what the tabernacle would look like as it was being built, but in reality it hadn't even been started yet. God was still telling Moses exactly how it was to be built. So what were the people of Israel doing while Moses met with God on the mountain? Well, they did what you and I might be guilty of doing at times--they got impatient with the wait. Day after day went by and still Moses did not appear. So the people went before Aaron. They did the unthinkable. They asked Aaron to make them some gods that could help them out. Moses had brought them out of Egypt, they said, but Moses was gone and they did not know if he was ever coming back. We humans have a very short memory. It wasn't Moses who had brought the people up out of slavery--it was their awesome God! Perhaps they remembered this, but the Israelites lived in a world where one god was good, but two or three or ten was even better. "So, Aaron, make us some gods to help us out here!"

Aaron told them to take all their golden earrings and bring them to him. Aaron took the gold and molded it into the shape of a calf. When the people saw it they said, "These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of Egypt." Aaron built an altar before the calf and proclaimed that tomorrow they would have a feast to the Lord. How do you think God viewed this idea? Think of the first two commandments: "You shall have no other gods before me," and "You shall not make an idol." The children of Israel had already broken both of these commandments. They got up early the next day and had their feast, and, up on the mountaintop, God was watching. He said to Moses, "Go down, because your people, whom you brought up out of Egypt, have become corrupt. They have been quick to turn away from what I commanded them." Then God told Moses about the golden calf that Aaron made and that the people were now worshipping it. God's anger was very great against the people, and He talked about destroying them all and beginning a new nation with Moses. But Moses pleaded with God not to do this. He asked God to forgive the people and to remember the covenant He had made with Abraham to make of him a great nation. God heard Moses and decided not to harm the people.

Moses came down off the mountain, and as he came near the camp he saw the awful sin the people were doing. His anger was so great that he took the two stone tablets on which God had written His law and threw them down and broke them. He took the calf they had made, ground it into dust, put the dust into water, and made the children of Israel drink it. Then he turned to his brother Aaron and asked him why he had taken part in this terrible sin. Instead of being honest and admitting he was wrong, Aaron blamed everything on the people, saying they were evil. Then, to make matters worse, he told Moses he had taken the gold they had given him, put it into the fire, and the golden calf had just popped out!

Moses had heard enough. He asked all those who were willing to stand on the Lord's side to come to him. Only the Levites came. God then used the Levites to bring forth His judgment on those who would not repent from worshiping the idol by killing about 3,000 people that day. In spite of all this, God did not withdraw His promise to lead His children to the Promised Land. However, their sin would keep God from being present with them as they traveled. This news made the Israelites very sad. They were sorry they had sinned and caused God to be angry with them. Once again, Moses spoke to God for the people. If God was not going to lead them into the promised land, they would not be recognized as His people. They would not be separate from all the other people of the world. Now God loved Moses very much, and so He decided to do as Moses asked and said He would lead the people once again. Then Moses did something very bold. He asked God if He would show him His glory! Moses had been in God's presence, had talked with Him, but he wanted more. He wanted to actually see the God he worshiped. God gently explained that what Moses was asking was impossible: "You cannot see My face, for no man shall see Me and live." But to honor Moses, God placed him in a rock with a big crack in the side of it, and covered him with His hand as He passed by. Then He took His hand away, and Moses saw the back side of God's glory. Even that small glimpse of God caused Moses' face to glow with light for many days after that.

God then told Moses to cut two more tablets of stone--just like the ones that had been broken--and bring them to the top of the mountain. God was going to write the Ten Commandments down again on the tablets. He passed by the tablets and said, "The Lord, the Lord, the compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger, abounding in love and faithfulness. . ." It's remarkable that God would say this after His people had turned their backs on Him, but He was showing Moses and the people what He is like. As their Creator, God had every right to destroy the Israelites for daring to worship the golden calf. Yet He chose to show mercy and love for His disobedient children. This is a great reminder to us today that our God is One who forgives NOT because we deserve it, but because He is merciful and gracious. How do you respond to a God like that?--with a heart of obedience.

Now Moses gathered all the people of Israel together to begin the building of the tabernacle. They were to willingly bring everything that would be needed for the building. What were some of the items the people were asked to bring? (from last week's story). How did God's people respond to this? They not only brought everything that was needed, they brought so much that Moses actually had to tell them to stop giving!

After this, Moses called for the builders and artists who would put everything together. All was done just the way God had instructed Moses on the mountaintop. The tabernacle, the Ark of the Covenant, all the articles used in the tabernacle, and the priests' clothing were put together by God's chosen workers. The tabernacle was completed about one year after the Exodus from Egypt, while the people were camped at Mount Sinai.

After the tabernacle was finished, the cloud that had been the sign of God's presence among His people moved to cover the tabernacle. The glory of God Himself filled it. The people had been faithful to follow God's instructions in building the tabernacle, and now God kept His promise and used it for His dwelling place. Whenever the cloud raised up, the people would follow it. In this way God led them on their journeys.

Did you notice something about Moses as we looked at these final chapters of Exodus? What did he do when the children of Israel failed or were disobedient? Did he throw up his hands and say, "I give up! God is right. You are a stiff-necked people." No. Every time Moses had the chance, he prayed to God for the people. He asked God not to destroy them. He asked God to stay with them. God responded with grace to Moses' prayers.

We can learn a lot from Moses' example of prayer for others. After the people had made their golden calf, Moses told God that he would rather have his name taken out of the Book of Life than to not have

God forgive them. He loved the people of Israel, but he loved God more. Having God's judgment fall on His own people would cause the other nations of the world to see Him only as an angry God (though we know His anger was deserved). Moses did not want God's name to be spoken of with anything but the greatest honor and respect. Praying for the Israelites to be obedient and to bring honor to God's name was the best thing Moses could have done. It's the same with us today. When we pray for other Christians to live lives which would please God, we are showing that we want God to be honored and glorified. We want no shame to be upon His holiness by someone who claims to be His but lives an evil life. Praying for that person is important. If they turn from their sin and back to God, that brings glory to His name!

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### Look:



**Can Jealousy and Selfishness Be a Good Thing? (Discussion).** God does not want us to covet things others have. He does not want us to be jealous of others' possessions or abilities. However, in today's Bible Adventure, we learn how God is a jealous God. What do you think this means, and how can jealousy be a good thing for God, but not for His people? In addition, God wants us to be generous to others and share with them. God does not want to share His people with anything or anyone else. Why is this O.K? Can you find other scripture passages which confirm God's desire to have His people all for Himself and not share them with anything else? Are there other verses in the Bible which tell us that God is a jealous God?



**Strip the Golden Calf (Bible Passage Review Game).** On two large pieces of butcher paper, copy the drawing provided on **EXO09.GF7** of the sickly looking naked calf. Cover these drawings with an equal number of pieces of torn yellow or gold construction paper. Divide the class into two teams and designate a leader for each team. Give the leader a bell, flag, whistle, or something they can use to signal when their team is ready to answer the question. The teacher asks a question reviewing the information covered in class this morning, or reviewed from previous lessons in Exodus. The team who responds first (ringing, raising, or blowing) is given an opportunity to answer the question. If they answer correctly, they are allowed to remove one piece of gold from their calf. If the question is incorrectly answered, the other team is allowed an opportunity to answer the question. The winner is the team that removes all the golden covering first, leaving the calf looking sickly--unworthy of worship. Note to teachers: You will need to prepare these questions before class.



**Exodus in Numbers (Worksheet).** Have students place a number next to each event indicating the order of occurrence in the book of Exodus, **EXO09.GF8 Pg. 1**. Answer key is shown on **EXO09.GF8 Pg. 2**.



**Responding to a Compassionate and Gracious God (Craft).** Using a half-sheet of red construction paper, cut out a heart. Paste the memory verse and title text (**1EXO09.GF9 Pgs. 1&2**) on the front of the heart and the reference (**EXO09.GF9 Pg. 3**) on the back. Cut out another heart smaller than the red one from a quarter sheet of white construction paper. Paste the "Love and obey Him" text (**1EXO09.GF9 Pg. 4**) on one side and the Deuteronomy 6:4-5 reference (**1EXO09.GF9 Pg. 5**) on the back. Punch small holes at the top and bottom of the red heart, and another one in the top of the smaller white heart. Thread yarn through these, linking them together and providing you with a piece to hang it from the top. Review these verses with the kids and talk about how merciful and gracious God is, and how we are called to love Him and live our lives in obedience to His commands. We, just like the Israelites, often fall so short of this, and are much more deserving of God's wrath than His grace. End your craft time in prayer, thanking God for His compassion, grace, and abounding love and faithfulness to His children.

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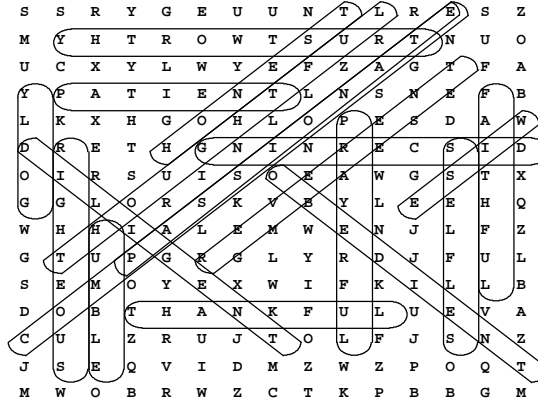

**Be Aware of Our Own Distractions (Group Activity).** What are ways that our attention can be directed away from God? Using the sheets completed during HOOK time (**EXO09.GF2**), instruct each child to tear or cut out 1 or 2 of the items they wrote down within the heart shapes and come up to the front of the class and tape them to the shape of the sickly and naked calf (still up on the wall from the LOOK time game). As each child takes their turn, the calf will once again become covered. Talk about how things, people, or activities in our lives, can become like idols if they take our attention away from God.




**Waiting Sometimes Makes Us Grumble (Discussion).**  As the Israelites waited for Moses to return from the mountain, they became impatient. Their impatience turned to grumbling. This grumbling weakened Aaron's ability to make wise decisions. He must have been tired of hearing all their complaining, so he finally gave in to them. Do your grumbles and complaints wear down your parents? Do you ever keep whining until they finally give in to your desires? Can these grumbings cause your parents to give in and allow you to make poor choices? What should your response be when your parents take a long time in responding to your questions? Have you ever pushed your parents into a decision that you wanted them to make which turned out to be the wrong choice?



**Interceding in Prayer for Others (Prayer Time).** This is a perfect lesson to discuss intercessory prayer and to spend some concentrated time praying for others. Review the portions of today's Scripture where Moses prayed for God's mercy upon the Israelites. Look closely at his words. His prayers were "God-centered," not "man-centered." He did not want God's name to be dishonored. He was not asking for the Israelites to be spared for their good, but for the good of God. Record prayer requests and pray for our missionaries (specific prayer requests are available from Debbie in the church office), neighbors, families, and friends. Your goal in these prayers should be to honor God.



**God Gets the Glory (Worksheet or Take-Home page).** Even after God had miraculously brought His people out of Egypt (review plagues, Red Sea, manna, quail, provision of water, etc.), they forgot what He had done for them. They once again began to grumble and look elsewhere for fulfillment. Do we give God the credit for all He does in our lives? Fill in the blanks on **EXO09.GF11**, and take this home to use during the week. For the younger kids, it might be helpful if the teachers provide the Scripture references to look up each day. They could write these on their papers so that they would have them at home.


 **Wordless Bracelet (Craft).** Encourage students to use this craft based on the “Wordless Book,” as a tool to share the message of salvation with others. Copies of instructions for the “Wordless Book” written by CEF, are available at the resource table and can be used in presenting this craft to the class. Each student will need:


- (1) Leather strand, 18 inches (long enough to go 1½ times around wrist)
- (7) Macramé beads (2 purple, 1 gold, 1 black, 1 red, 1 white and 1 green)

Instruct students to tie a knot in one end of the strand and thread both purple beads onto the other end. These will be used as fasteners. Next, have them string the beads in the following order and meaning:

- Gold = Heaven/Streets of Gold (Revelation 21:21)
- Black = Sin (Romans 3:23)
- Red = Christ’s blood/Forgiveness (Hebrews 9:22)
- White = White as snow (Psalm 51:7)
- Green = Growth in Christ (II Peter 3:18)

Complete the bracelet by threading the unknotted end through the purple bead closest to the knot and then through the next purple bead. Knot at the end and adjust to fit.

 **Tenth Commandment (Memory/Discussion).** If you have decided to assemble the Ten Commandments as you go through them, post the tenth commandment, “**You shall not covet anything that belongs to your neighbor**” now. Follow the instructions given on **1EXO01 Pg. 5 TOOK First Commandment**. Use this in conjunction with the Ten Commandments Family Take-Home Sheets and magnet collection below. **Debrief:** What is covetousness? We've learned in our Bible lesson that covetousness is wrongly wanting something that belongs to someone else. It is based on greed and the desire for more, which are sinful attitudes of the heart. Covetousness is wrong because it wrongly believes that God hasn't given us enough or all that we need and that somehow He's made a mistake in giving us what He already has. We need to guard our hearts from this sinful attitude and remember that God indeed has given us all that we'll ever need.

 **Ten Commandments (Family Take-Home Sheet/Magnet Collection).** Encourage the students to earn their magnets each week. This week students will have the opportunity to earn their Ninth Commandment magnet when they turn in their Ten Commandment Family Take-Home Sheet, which has been signed by their parents. *(Teachers, please be sensitive to each student’s individual needs in regard to their home situation. You may need to make yourself available to some students so that they may be able to participate in this.)* Take-Home Sheets are included with the Family Fun Sheets and are also available at the resource table.

**Sibling:** *Entering room.* “Mom/Dad said you had to, so you’d better get going.”

**Sibling:** *Leaving room.* “Fine, we’ll see what Mom/Dad has to say about this.”

### Scene 3:

Stella/Oliver is now sitting stiffly in a chair, holding the neck with both hands and moaning.

**Mom/Dad:** *Entering room.* “The rules are you do your homework before you play.”

**Stella/Oliver:** *Almost crying.* “Mom/Dad my neck hurts so bad, I can’t even move it.”

**Mom/Dad:** *Sitting down next to Stella/Oliver.* “You think you can tell me when it first started hurting?”

**Stella/Oliver:** “Ya, it was when we were playing a game. They didn’t want to play by my rules, so I took my game and left.”

**Mom/Dad:** “Has it been steadily getting worse?”

**Stella/Oliver:** “Ya, when I was mumbling about what spoiled sports they were, it really started to hurt. And then, when I didn’t do my homework, it got so bad that I couldn’t even move.”

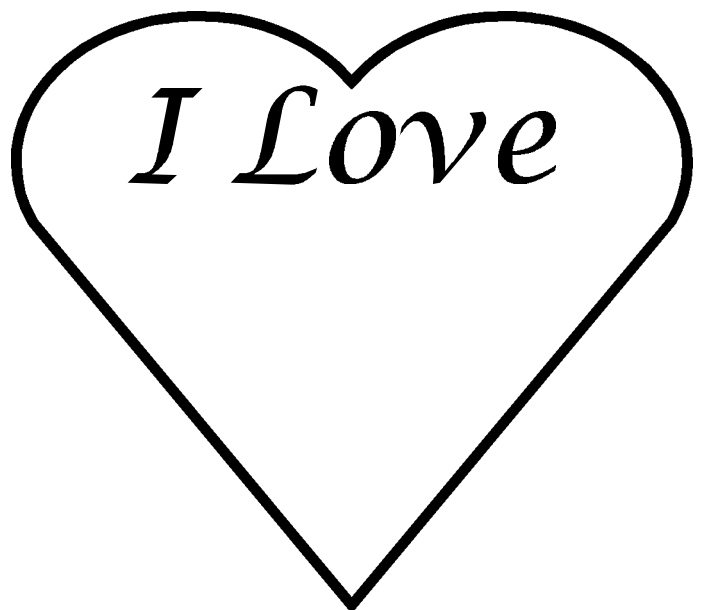
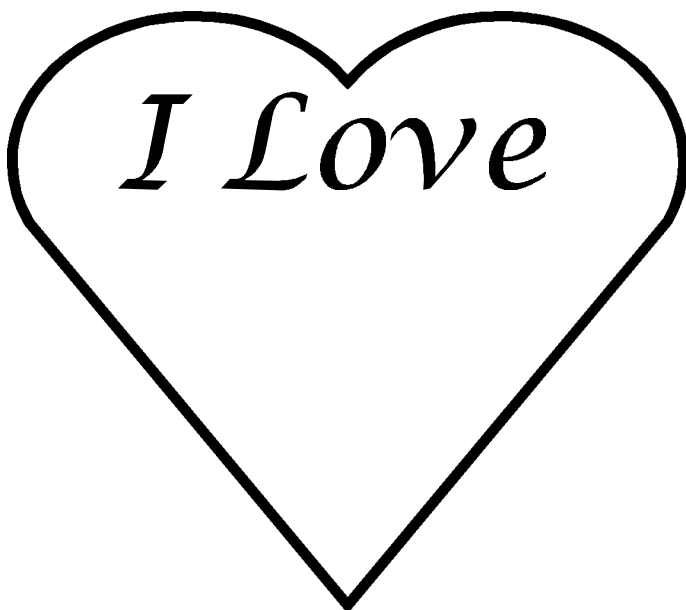
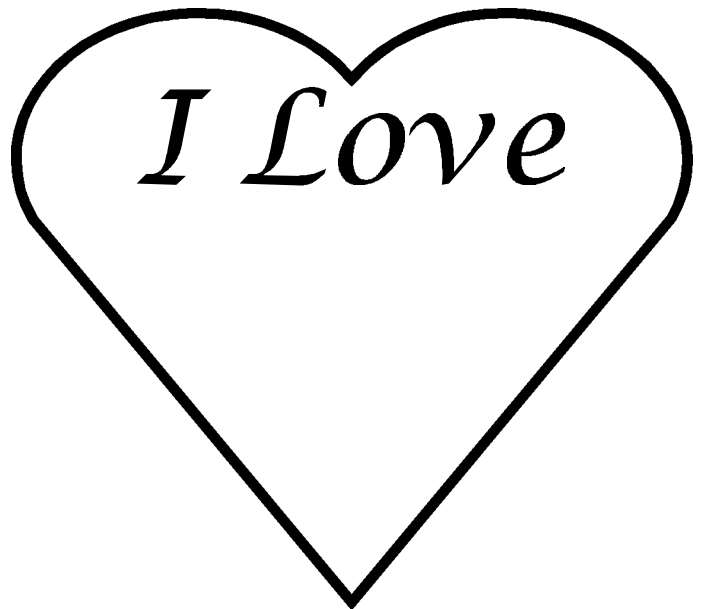
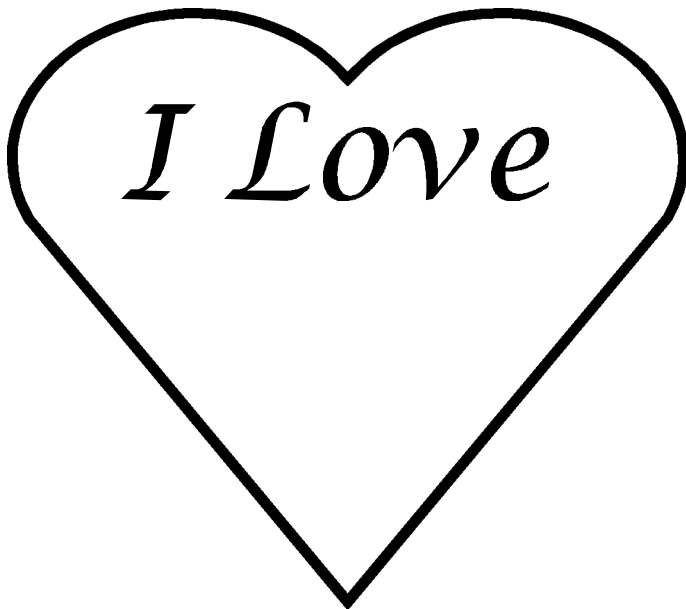
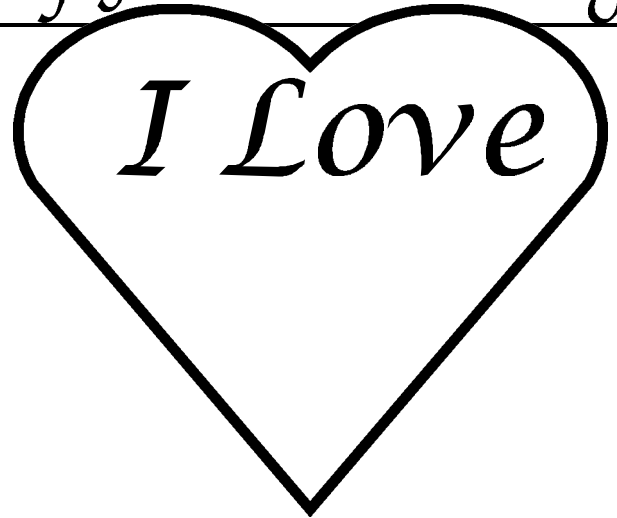
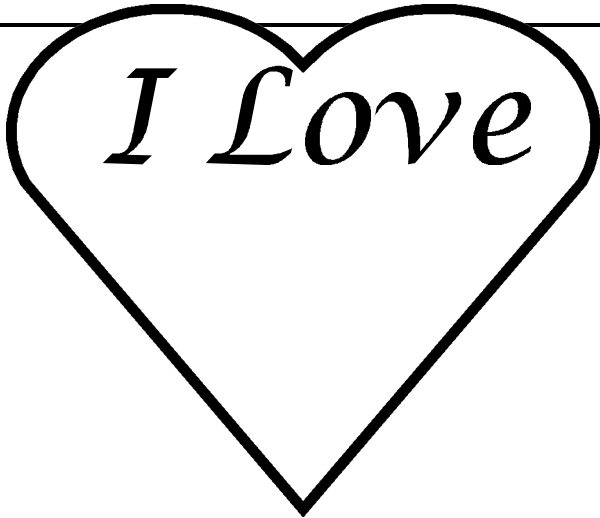
