Aim Questions:

1. **What do you remember about Ezekiel from last week?** (*Clay model; Ezekiel lay on his side; cut his hair, etc.*)
2. **What is the theme of Ezekiel and how did God transport Ezekiel over 500 miles?** (*God's Glory won't mix with your sin; By the hair--Ouch!*)
3. **What did the elders do in secret and how did they excuse their behavior?** (*Pagan worship; "The Lord does not see us; the Lord has forsaken the land." Ezekiel 8:12*) **With whom does the judgment begin on Israel?** (*The Elders*)
4. **In Ezekiel 11:4 the scripture tells about meat in a cooking pot. What did the evil leaders say it illustrated and what did God say it illustrated?**
5. **What things do you do your own way when God doesn't do things your way? Why do you do that?**

 **Hook:**

NEVER MIX. Object Lesson. God's Glory and your sin will never mix. To illustrate this you will need corn syrup, water, red and blue food coloring, vegetable oil, and a large clear drinking glass. **Step 1:** Pre-mix the water with the food coloring to represent SIN. (Make it a very dark color) **Step 2:** Pour corn syrup into the drinking glass to represent GOD'S GLORY. **Step 3:** Tilt the glass and pour the colored water slowly into the glass to represent ISRAEL'S SIN. Note that God's glory and sin won't mix! **Step 4:** Tilt the glass again and pour about 2 inches of vegetable oil into the glass to represent GOD'S GLORY. Debrief: God's Glory surrounded Israel but would never mix with their sin.

LIGHTS ON/OFF. Object Lesson: Turn off the lights. Turn the lights back on. Just as light and darkness cannot occupy the same space at the same time, so God's glory cannot exist in the presence of unrepentant sin. It's the essence of His nature to be intolerant of sin just as light by its very presence repels the darkness.

HAIR TOUR. Drama. Bring in a "Buddy" doll by the hair and show the doll around the room. Give a short narration of who is in the room and what they are doing. Exit the room. Debrief: This is a brief glimpse into today's Adventure. Listen for this hair raising experience!

Bible Adventure -

I'm sure you'll agree that what we've learned about the prophet Ezekiel so far shows us that he was a man God used in very unusual and unforgettable ways. Ezekiel saw God in a vision and ate a scroll, taking God's Word into his body and spirit. These events changed Ezekiel and made him ready to be God's messenger to the Jewish exiles. Last week we heard about some of the unusual ways God asked Ezekiel to give His message to the people. Ezekiel built a model of Jerusalem and showed how the city would be attacked and closed off so that no one could escape. He lay on his side for 430 days to show the people how many years they would be disobedient to God. He shaved off his hair and beard to show them that many would die when the Babylonians attacked. These are pretty powerful messages and show us that God really wanted to get His people's attention!

While all this was going on, God showed Ezekiel another vision of the future. He sent a heavenly being who lifted Ezekiel up by his hair and carried him over 500 miles to Jerusalem. What a way to travel! In his vision, Ezekiel is allowed to see firsthand just why it is that God's people are going to be judged. Ezekiel first saw the temple in Jerusalem. God's glory was over the temple. But there were other things there too; things that grieved God's heart and caused His anger to grow toward His people. Right inside the north entrance of the temple was an idol. God called it the "idol of jealousy." We don't know exactly what the idol was, but God called it detestable, meaning it was absolutely to be hated. God said to Ezekiel, "Son of man, do you see what they are doing--the utterly detestable things that the house of Israel is doing here, things that will drive me far from my sanctuary? But you will see things that are even more detestable." What could be more hateful to God than to have a statue of a false god set up in His own house and to have His people worshipping it? Let's find out what Ezekiel saw next. The heavenly being brought him to the wall of the inner court of the temple and had him dig a hole in the wall and look through. In the inner court were 70 elders of Israel, standing in the darkness burning incense in worship of all kinds of carvings or paintings of evil animals and creeping things. Each one had their own idol they were worshipping. They said "the Lord does not see us. He has forsaken the land." Instead of accepting God's judgment of His people in the past as being right and just and well-deserved, they accused God of abandoning them! They did not see God's judgment as being part of His plan to bring them back to Himself, but convinced themselves that He did not exist because He had not protected them from harm. As Ezekiel watched, God again said to him, "You will see them doing things that are even more detestable." Ezekiel was taken back toward the entrance of the temple, where he saw women mourning over the death of the false god Tammuz. Tammuz was the Babylonian god of vegetation (or plants). Those who worshipped Tammuz believed that it was he who brought the rains and made things grow. They were weeping for him because it was winter and they hoped to bring Tammuz to life so the earth would turn green and things would grow again. The women had forgotten that all life comes from God and God alone. The last thing God showed Ezekiel was a group of 25 men at the entrance to the temple. They were facing away from the temple and bowing down toward the sun in the east, worshipping it. In doing this they were showing they had turned their backs on God.

Does anyone remember the first and second of the ten commandments? The first is, "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery. You shall have no other gods before me." The second commandment is this: "You shall not make for yourself an idol in the form of anything in heaven above or on the earth beneath or in the waters below. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God...." The Israelites of Ezekiel's time were about to find out just how serious God was when He gave them His commandments. God's anger with Israel's idolatry had built to such a point that He had decided He must punish them for their disobedience. God had His fill of Israel trying to mix her sin with His glory, so He begins to move His

glory out of the temple. He called six more heavenly beings which were warriors carrying deadly weapons, and another being who would be God's scribe. The task God gave to these heavenly beings was to go through the city and find all those people whose hearts were broken over Israel's sin. These would receive a mark on their foreheads. What happened to the rest of the people? They were to be killed in punishment for their hard, stubborn hearts. The first to be judged were the elders in the temple who were busily doing everything God had forbidden them to do. Remember? "You shall have no other gods before me." "You shall not make for yourself an idol." How far the people had come from the covenant they had made with God! God next had the heavenly scribe gather hot coals from beneath His throne and scatter them over the city, another sign that Jerusalem would undergo God's judgment. God said to the city leaders that they were not safe from that judgment, even though they bragged that they were.

Ezekiel was very concerned by God's words. He was worried that God's judgment would be so fierce that not one of His people would remain alive. God gave Ezekiel a wonderful promise--to gather His people back in their own land someday, to renew their hearts and cause them to worship Him again. After God had told Ezekiel this, an amazing and rather frightening thing happened. The glory of God, which had always been over the temple, lifted up over it and left the city. It has not returned to this day.

Why did this happen? Why did God take such a drastic step? God called the things that were going on in the temple detestable. God is absolutely holy. He cannot tolerate sin. It's not that He chooses not to tolerate it--it is a reaction that comes from the very nature of who He is. Sin cannot stand for even a split second before the face of God. The Jews in the temple not only were doing things that were hateful to God, they were blaming Him for it! Imagine that! Have you been tempted to do the same thing? Maybe you don't blame God outright, but you blame others for your sin. Your parents make mistakes so you think you don't need to obey them. You are hurtful to someone because they had been hurtful to you. You gossip about someone because you think they are a snob. Something bad happens and you get angry with God because He didn't even try to prevent it. We throw our expectations and wishes up into God's face and then get mad when He doesn't do what we want. Of course God knows that we are only human and will fall into sin from time to time, but we should never try to place the blame on anyone but ourselves. We should never use the excuse that things just aren't going the way we'd like, so we'll just do things our own way. When things are going wrong, a mature Christian will take a close look at his life, confess the sin he sees, make up his mind to turn from it, and go on with getting to know God and serve Him. Will you make your mind up today to be that kind of believer?



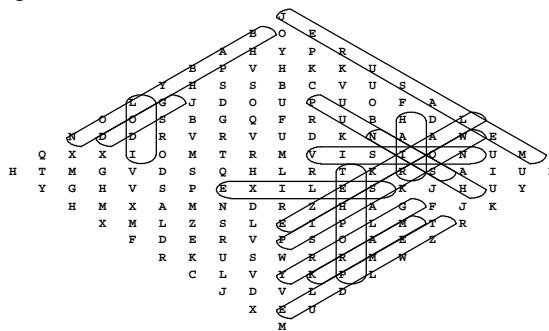

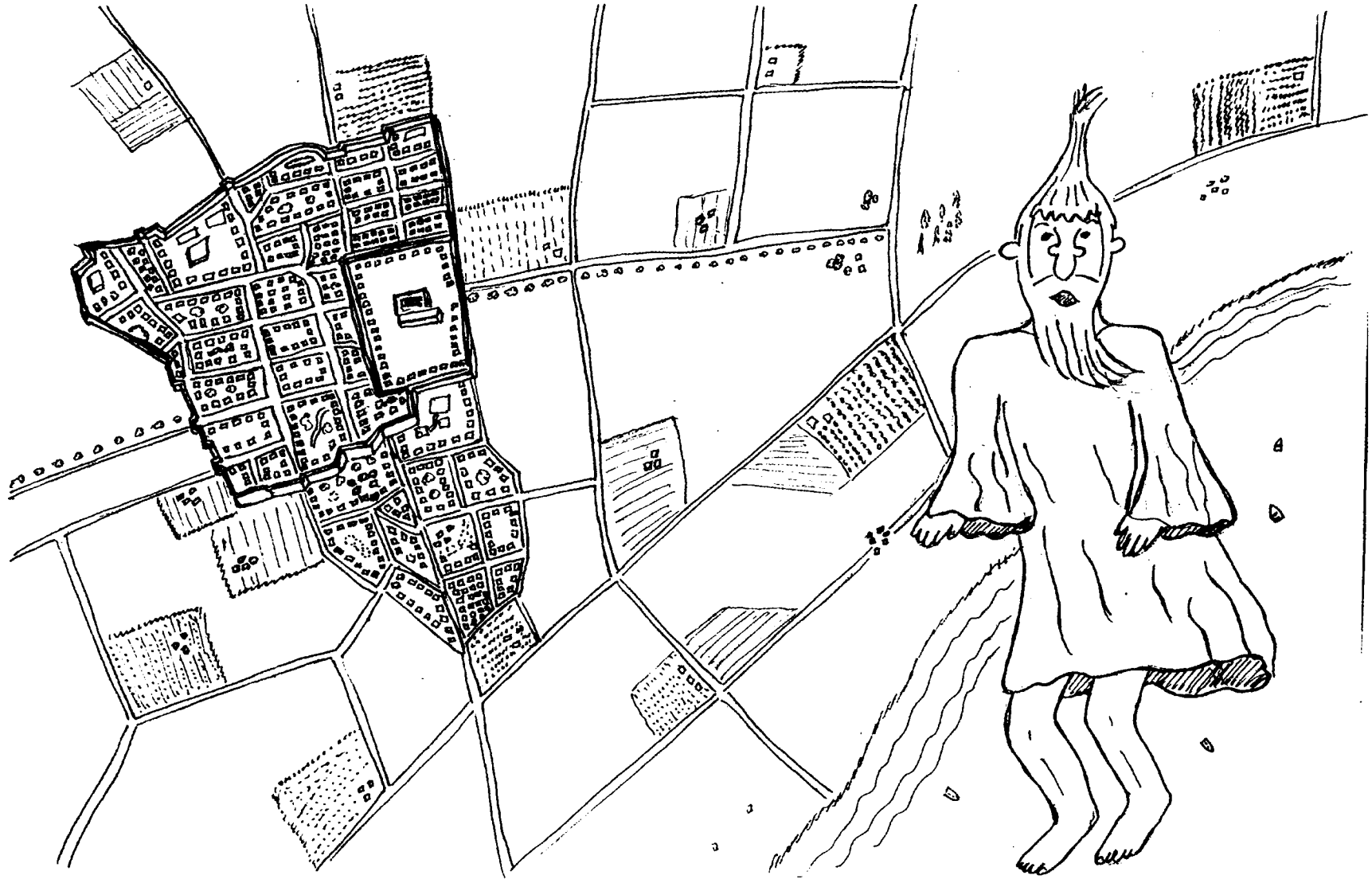
LOOK IT UP. Discussion. Remember the picture from Jeremiah of the person with his eyes closed and his fingers in his ears? (Demonstrate this "attitude" and maybe have students do it, too.) What did it mean? (Read Jeremiah 5:21) Now, read Ezekiel 8:18. Who has closed eyes and ears now? Is there any connection? Read Ezekiel 9:10 & 11:21.

OIL & WATER. Object Lesson. What you will need: Baby food jars, water, food coloring, and salad oil. To illustrate God's glory won't mix our sin, put colored water and salad oil in the clear container; stir, seal, & shake. Have each student put one together as a reminder.

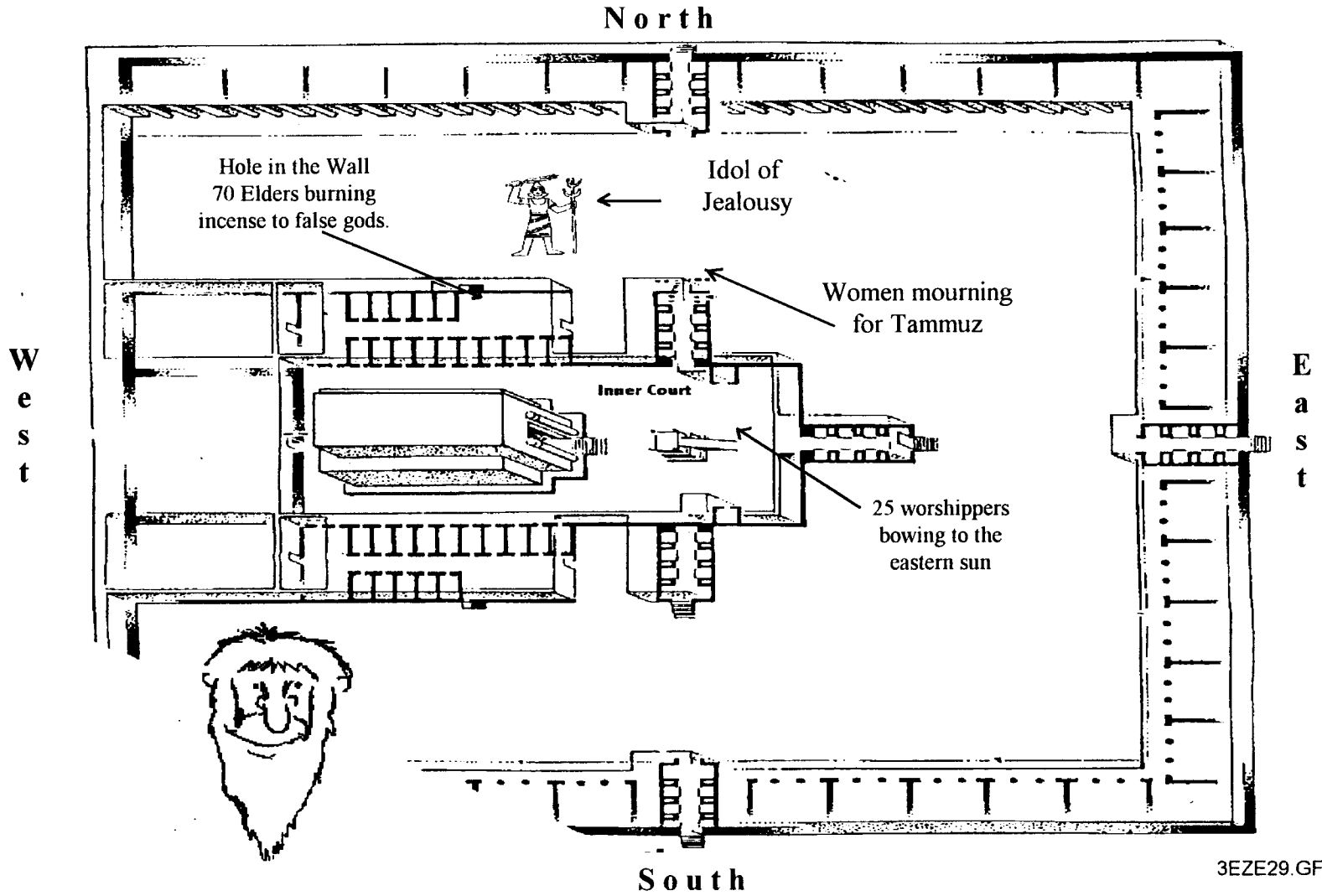
BLAME. Discussion. The people of Jerusalem actually blamed God for their sin. Ask students if they have heard a person blame God or someone else when they did something wrong. Maybe they've done it themselves. How might a person blame God or someone else when they cheated on a test or stole something from a store? Who should be blamed when we sin?



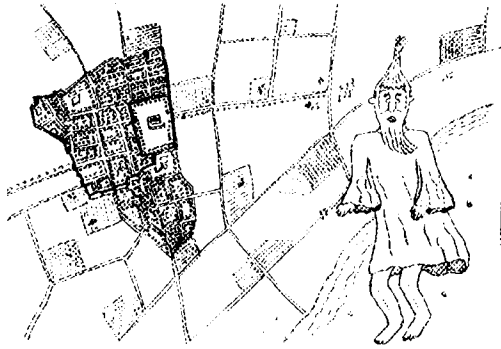

6 game pieces (represents players)

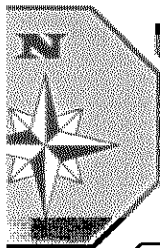
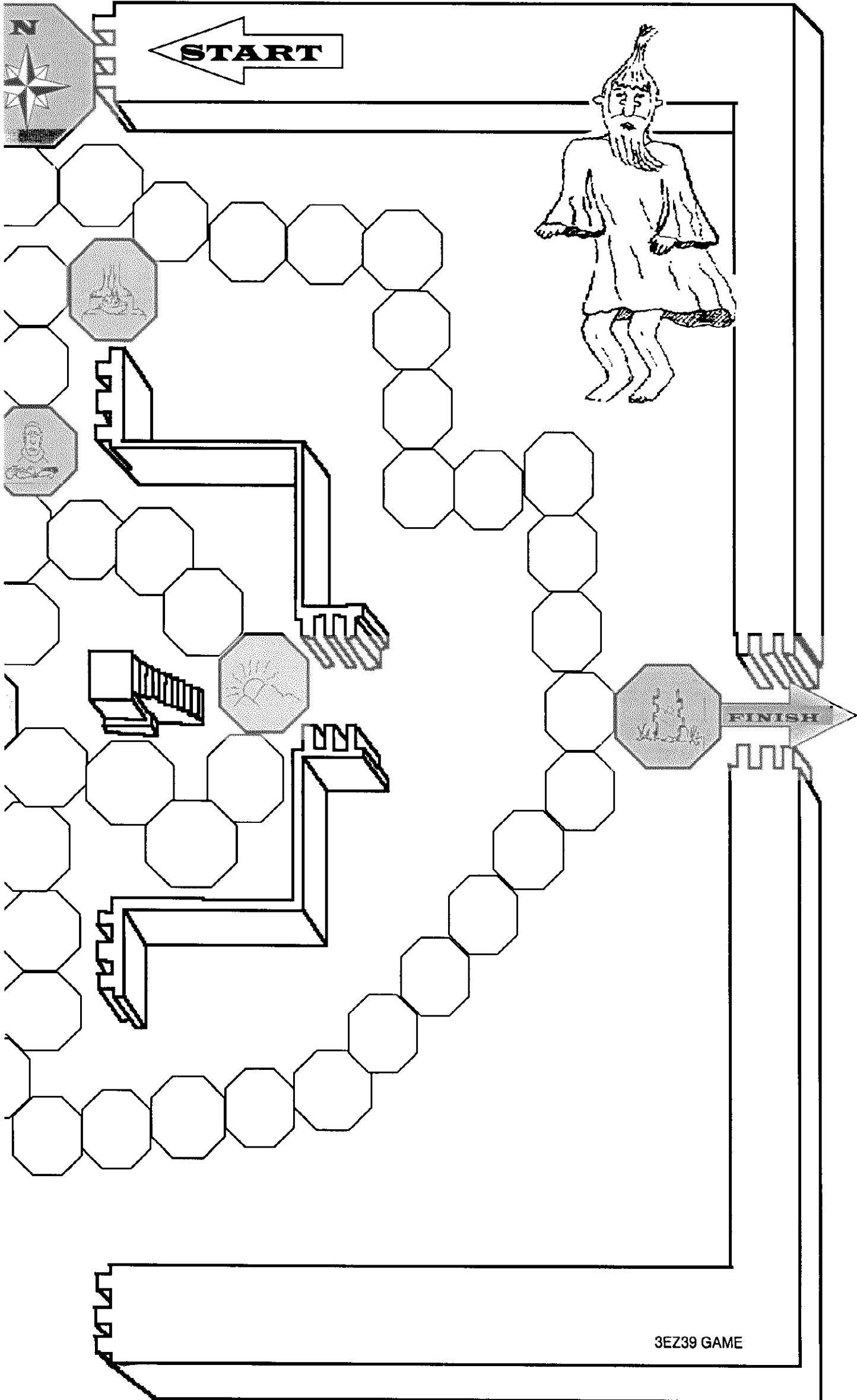
HOW TO PLAY: A game host is chosen and given all game cards. Game host will ask the questions and reward players with cards when answered correctly. (Answers are underlined.) Cards answered incorrectly are placed on the bottom of the stack. All players roll the die. The highest number rolled goes first. Play then moves clockwise. Can be played in teams with discussion of answers allowed.

MOVING: Players must stop on all 6 AREAS. An exact roll is not required. For Example: If you are 5 spaces from an AREA and you roll a 6, you can stop on that AREA to answer a question. If you roll a 4, but are 5 spaces away, you must try again on your next turn. To receive a card you must answer the question correctly. You may then move any additional spaces you have left on your roll towards your next AREA. Plan wisely, if you have a high number, you may be able to get to two AREAS. If answered incorrectly, you must remain in the same AREA until you answer the next question correctly. You must move to each AREA and answer a question. You don't have to go to the AREAS in any particular order. You can *WARP* out of AREA #2 on a correct answer. You must wait however for your next turn to answer another question. Choose wisely or you will be doomed.

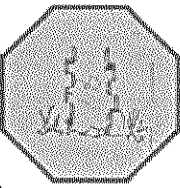
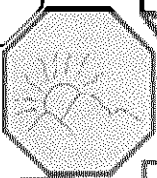
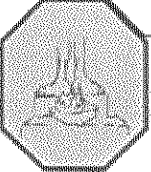
GETTING DOOMED: If another player lands on your space by exact count, you're DOOMED! You must return immediately to START. Your opponent then occupies the space given up by you.

- AREA # 6:** South side of the Temple - Prophet Review Questions



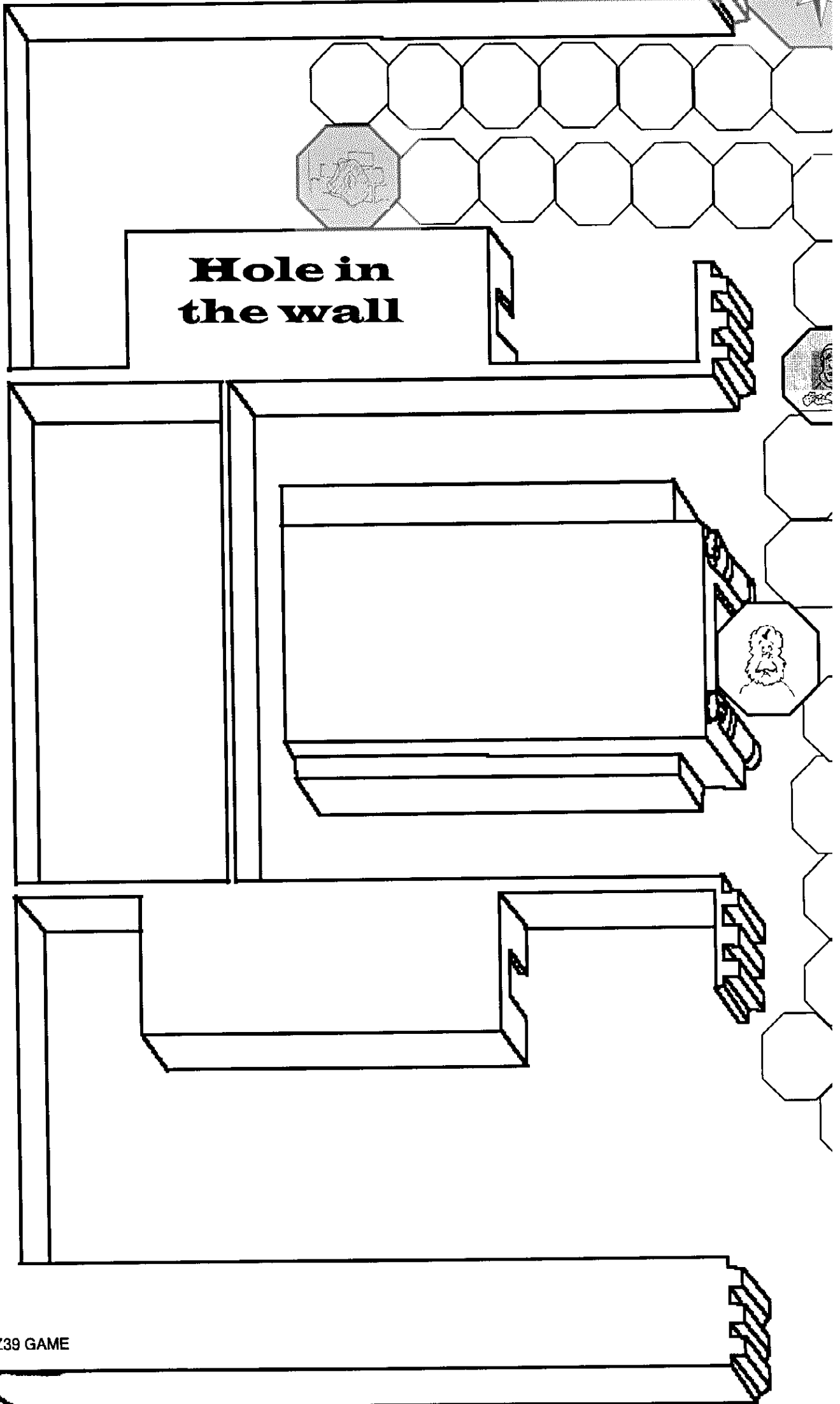
