 **Hook:**

- Who’s Your Neighbor? (Discussion).** ,  Write today’s Bible verse on the whiteboard. Ask the students what a neighbor is/who their neighbors are. Make sure that they understand that this verse applies to siblings, classmates, friends, relatives, or anyone they meet, not just those who live on their block.
- Reasons Why We Help One Another (Discussion).** ,  Ask the students to give some reasons why one person might help another person. List their answers on the whiteboard. Ask them for the motive behind each reason. Is the motive purely love for another person/God (to glorify God; the person was unable to do something for himself, etc.). Or is there a benefit to the person who is helping (it makes me look good, I get extra allowance, etc.). Circle those reasons that are done with pure, selfless motives. Explain that these are most pleasing to the Lord.
- Are You Plugged Into the Power? (Object Lesson/Discussion).** ,  Bring in several items that need a power source to operate properly. Call several students up to the front of the class to demonstrate how these items are used. They do not work well, as intended by their maker, when not plugged into the power source. We are like these items in that we, too, cannot be used (work well) as our Creator intended without being plugged into the power source (God).
- Bearing Each Other's Burdens (Activity/Discussion).** ,  Bring in some heavy items and place them at one end of the room. As the students arrive, ask them to move the objects to the other side of the classroom. Once this task has been completed, talk to them about how difficult it would have been to move those items all alone. It was so much easier to move them with help from fellow classmates. This may even be set up as a game or a relay. This morning they will hear about another type of burden that is much easier to carry when someone else is there to help.
- What Is Love? (Activity/Discussion).** ,  Draw a large heart on the whiteboard, or tape a large heart-shaped piece of butcher paper to the wall, and ask the students for words or phrases that describe "love." What does it mean to love someone? How do we know that our parents love us? Is it okay to love ourselves? What are some ways that we can demonstrate our love for someone else? Ask them if they know that, out of all of God’s commandments, this is the one that summarizes or ties all of them together.

 **Hands Working for God (Activity).** 🍌, 🦋 Trace the students' hands on white paper. Label the back of the hands and set aside until the TOOK time. While you are tracing hands, review the fruit of the Spirit. Explain that this morning we will be talking about doing good works for God. The Holy Spirit gives us the power to do truly good works even when we are tired!


 **How Do You Care for Yourself? (Discussion/Activity).** 🍌, 🦋 Bring in items to use for your discussion on taking care of ourselves. Explain to the students that we work hard at being sure that we get what we need. When we are hungry we ask Mom for a snack. When we are thirsty we take a drink of water. When we are tired we rest. When we are cold we put on warmer clothes. If we feel warm we do something to cool down, such as opening a window, removing a sweater, going swimming, or sitting in front of a fan. When we get hurt we seek help from someone who can make us feel better. Just as we care for ourselves, the Bible tells us that we should care for our fellow believers. When someone is sad we can encourage him or her. When someone needs help we are there for him or her. If we see a brother or sister in Christ who is struggling in sin, the Bible tells us to love them and care for them, with just as much dedication as we would care for ourselves.


 **Thank You Teachers!!! (Discussion).** 🍌, 🦋 Who are the people who teach? Help the students to realize that there are lots of people in their lives who teach them things. It doesn't have to be a formal schoolteacher: their parents, grandparents, pastors, siblings, neighbors, and their Bible school teachers. Explain that they are going to be looking at Galatians chapter 6 this morning, and learning that the Apostle Paul told the Galatians that if you are taught from the Word, you are to share with the person who is teaching you how this teaching has helped you. Now go back and ask the students if they can think of anything they have been taught about Jesus and who taught them? Keep track of what they say individually, as they will have an opportunity to write a thank-you note to that person during the TOOK time this morning.

Presentation Ideas –

 **Work Gloves (Object Lesson).** 🍌, 🦋 While wearing work gloves, talk about working. Working in the yard takes physical strength; working for God takes spiritual strength that comes from the Holy Spirit. As Christians, we have the power to do good and serve others as Christ served us. If we are walking and working in the Spirit, we will be displaying the fruit of the Spirit. Turn your hands over and reveal the words with the different fruit of the Spirit written on the fingers of your work gloves.

 **Be Gentle, I'm Fragile (Drama).** 🍌, 🦋 Perform a short drama to contrast the difference between gentle accountability with a fellow believer and a harsh attack on him and his sins. Begin by having two teachers, dressed as hikers equipped with backpacks, walk around the room in a circle at different speeds as though hiking the trails of life. Scattered around the perimeter of the room are large rocks labeled with different sins. Alternately, each hiker will stop and stoop over to examine a rock, considering its temptation, and then, taking possession of it, will place it in his or her backpack. So the scene will shift back and forth with each hiker in different parts of the room. After packs are sufficiently weighed down, each hiker will meet a fellow Christian hiker on the trail and engage in "fellowship." Contrast these two examples of "fellowship" (i.e., loving one another in the Lord) by the dialogue that you develop in each. In one, have the fellow Christian approach the hiker with rough accountability, aggressively attacking the sin on his back without taking care of his well being. Perhaps equip this fellow Christian with a plastic sword or knife and have him attack the hiker's backpack recklessly, cutting his flesh as he blindly swipes at the straps. This hiker will leave wounded, discouraged and more apt to stumble on the next stone of sin. In the other dialogue, exemplify the kind of gentle and humble accountability evident in Paul's exhortation: that which restores a brother to a strong and focused walk with the Lord. This fellow trailside Christian will lovingly converse with the hiker and encourage him to open his backpack and share its contents with honesty. This fellowship will remove each sin from the backpack with concern and truth, exposing its offense and deceptive promises. This hiker will be encouraged and strengthened to walk the trail with agility, avoiding future stones with careful steps.

Bible Adventure for K – 2nd Grades -

The Judaizers had been trying to convince the Christians in Galatia that faith in Jesus Christ alone was not enough to be saved. They insisted that these Christians add good works to their faith in order to earn God's favor. Paul wrote a letter to the Galatians stating, in the strongest way possible, that the Judaizers were absolutely wrong! He said in no uncertain terms that salvation is found in Christ alone. But was Paul saying that God never wanted us to do good works?

Paul answered this question in the last part of his letter. He showed the Galatians that the Judaizers were following Jewish rituals and laws because they were selfish and prideful and wanted to look good in other people's eyes. Before Jesus came to earth, God had given His people many rules in the Law. But after Jesus came, He taught that all the rules of the Old Testament Law could be wrapped up in one word—love. Paul said in Galatians 5:14, "The entire law can be summed up in a single command: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'" The Judaizers definitely were not following the Law out of love for others. They were doing it for themselves, so they could feel good and righteous. Paul proceeded to tell the Galatians just how they could love one another.

True love comes from giving one's life completely over to the control of the Holy Spirit. This is called "walking in the Spirit." When Christ enters a person's life, He makes him a whole new person on the inside. He frees him from his selfish desires and makes it possible for him to truly love others as Christ Himself does.

Paul taught that Christians were to do good works for one another out of love. One way to do this is to bear one another's burdens. Galatians 6:2 says, "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." All of us have burdens. It is okay to have burdens and it is okay to ask others to help us with our burdens. That's God's design! The Church is God's big family meant to give Him glory as it displays to the world its love for one another. Christians are to love one another like they love themselves, which means they are to take care of each other like they are taking care of their own bodies. We usually make sure we get what we need, but God wants us to make sure that other people get what they need.

Sin is the biggest burden in our lives. When our Christian brothers and sisters struggle with sin, we are to help restore them to God. This means that we are to help them see God for who He is and encourage them to deal with sin in the right way, by confessing it to God and trusting Him to renew their hearts. Talking to someone about their sin is often a difficult thing to do, and Paul says that we are to do it with gentleness and humility.

Another way to show love to the Church is to help bear the burdens of those believers who are in leadership over us. Paul said in Galatians 6:6, "Anyone who receives instruction in the Word must share all good things with his instructor." Do you have leaders in your life who teach you God's Word? These leaders are encouraged when you share with them the good things in your life such as your good attitude, your good faith, and the money God has given you.

Paul told the Galatians not to grow tired of doing good things and showing love to one another. He didn't want them to become discouraged and forget that doing good in love is important. Sometimes we may feel that it is not even possible for us to do good for others. We feel that we are too bad to do anything good. But this is not what Paul was teaching. We must remember that the good we do is because of the Holy Spirit in our lives, not because we are good on our own.

But you have to ask yourself, "Am I a Christian? Has God made me a new person on the inside?" It is only when we have the Holy Spirit in our lives that we are capable of doing good works and showing true love to others. When we walk in the Spirit, we have the power to make the right choices and God's strength to truly love. We are set free from our sinful and selfish wants and desires.

If you are a Christian, are you helping others bear their burdens? Our biggest burden is sin and Paul said, "Brothers, if someone is caught in a sin, you who are spiritual (that is, you who are walking in the Spirit) should restore him gently" (Gal. 6:1). And don't forget to help your church leaders bear their burdens by sharing your good things with them. Lastly, pay close attention to Paul's words in Galatians 6:9,10: "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers."

Bible Adventure for 3^d – 6th Grades -

When we read Paul's letter to the Galatians, it is fairly easy to pick out the theme, the reason Paul wrote the letter in the first place. It was to defend the true Gospel: that man can be saved only by faith in God's Son, Jesus Christ. Only Christ can save us, and nothing else is needed. Paul was reminding the Christians in Galatia to hold onto this truth, and not listen to the lies of the false teachers, called Judaizers, who wanted these new believers to follow the laws of Moses, in order to be truly saved.

In the last part of Paul's letter, after he has reminded his friends about the true Gospel, he teaches them about true good works. These were not the same kind of good works that the Judaizers taught, like getting circumcised and following certain rules about food and other things. God had given His people these rules long ago to keep them separate from the rest of the nations, but now the Judaizers were teaching that following the rules could save a person. The laws given to Moses were never designed to save a person. Throughout the entire Bible, God promised to send a Messiah who would be the one and only way to God. When Jesus came, He taught us that all the rules of the Law are completed in love. He showed us that kind of love by dying on the cross in our place. In Galatians 5:14 Paul wrote, "The entire law is summed up in a single command: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'" Now, in this last part of his letter, he tells the Galatians exactly what it means to love somebody else as much as you love yourself.

Earlier in his letter, Paul had told the Galatians that they should "walk in the Spirit." Every believer has the Holy Spirit living in them, but walking in the Spirit means letting the Spirit control us. We put this into practice by putting God's Word into practice. We develop a lifestyle of obeying the teachings of Jesus found in God's Word. But the Judaizers, Paul wrote, did not want to follow Jesus' teachings, nor did they want to have their Jewish friends and family displeased with them for doing so. They wanted to look good to the Jewish community by keeping all the old rules. If they could convince others to do the same, they could brag about how they brought them over to their side. They weren't showing love to the new Christians by trying to get them to agree to follow the rules. They just wanted to look good in front of others. Their works were not of the Spirit of God but of the flesh.

It's pretty easy to fall into the trap of wanting to look good in front of others, isn't it? But this is walking in the flesh, and shows we are self-centered, wanting attention for ourselves. God wants our attention to be on others and how we can serve them. God's Holy Spirit gives us the power we need to stop being self-centered and to love other people the way Jesus loves us.

Paul told the Galatians that they should bear one another's burdens. Burdens are problems that seem too large for us to solve, difficult situations that can discourage us. We're to help each other with these in whatever way we can, even if it's only to be a listening ear or to give a word of encouragement. Sometimes God will have bigger ways for us to be able to help. This is one reason God has given us the Church. The Church is God's family, and when the members of the family show love to one another, the world sees and God receives glory because of it. Bearing one another's burdens means that we take care of others as well as we take care of ourselves. When you're hungry you eat, don't you? When you're cold you find a warm place to go or put on a jacket or sweater. When your heart is sad, you want someone to talk with you about it. These are needs that people all around you have, too, and God wants us to make sure that others are having those needs met. He uses us to do that.

A huge burden we all carry is sin. Sin puts a barrier between God and us. When we sin we are not walking in the Spirit because we have taken control of our lives. We lose the joy and peace that comes from being right with God. God wants us to help each other with this burden. Paul said if we see someone sinning that we are to "restore such a one." What we're helping to restore, or repair, is the other person's relationship with God. The purest kind of love that we can show others is to lead them to the knowledge of God. We are to help them see God for who He is and encourage them to deal with sin in the right way, by admitting it to God and trusting Him to make their hearts clean again. Talking about our sin with others can be a hard thing to do; so Paul tells the Galatians, and us, that we should do it with the greatest gentleness and humility. Remember, among the fruit of the Spirit are gentleness and kindness, so we know that God has given us everything we need to do His kind of good works.

Another way to love the Church is to bear the burdens of those who are our leaders. Think about the leaders in your own life, and your parents, the ones who teach you God's Word. You can encourage them by sharing with them how God is working in your life, and what you are learning about Him.

Paul told the Galatians not to grow weary or tired of doing good. It's tempting sometimes to feel that it doesn't make any difference what we do. Sometimes we feel that we are too bad to do anything good. But Paul teaches that walking by the Spirit doesn't depend on our feelings or how we are doing physically. In the Spirit's power we can do good things, but we can't in our own power. On our own, in our flesh, it's impossible. But the Spirit sets us free from the flesh. Paul said, "You, my brothers, were called to be free." Knowing the effect our flesh has on us, he also warned, "But do not use your freedom to indulge (or give in to) the sinful nature; rather, serve one another in love" (Galatians 5:13). The wrong thinking the Galatians could have fallen into was to think, "Great! I'm not under the Law anymore. I can do whatever I want and God will forgive me." But the God who gave Moses the Law to teach His people how to live is the same God who hates sin today. Paul warned that if the Galatians thought only of their flesh and pleasing themselves, they would end up destroying themselves. But if they learned to think of others, and did the kind of works that please the Spirit of God, then they would gain eternal life.

Let's back up and take another quick look at the kind of love God wants us to have for others: this love will do anything to help another person have a right relationship with God. This love helps others carry their burdens. It is humble and gentle, especially when helping others deal with a sin problem. It is not self-serving but serves others. This love encourages those who are our leaders. It takes every chance it can to do good, and does not get tired of doing it.

Aren't you glad that God has made you free to love others in this way? We are no longer slaves to what our flesh wants. We are no longer in the hopeless situation of trying to be good enough to earn heaven, and always failing. After we put our trust in Christ, He makes us a brand new person inside, and we live by the Spirit; and as we walk in the Spirit, letting Him control us, He will produce His fruit in our lives. The exciting thing is that now we have the power to follow God's Law. Paul tells us that the Law can be summed up in one sentence: "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Galatians 5:14). If we have the Spirit of God, then we have the freedom to love as God loves. We can choose the right thing and will always have God's strength to love others.

What kind of works are you busy doing? You have a choice to make, just as the Galatians did. Will you choose to do the good works of love that God wants from you? If you've trusted Christ to save you, you have the power to do it.

Aim Questions

1. **Who were the Judaizers and what did they teach?** *They were certain Jews who taught that salvation required Christ, plus the observance of the Law.*
2. **Why did the Judaizers teach this false gospel?** *They were selfish and wanted to look good in other people's eyes.*

Let's Look at Love (Worksheet). 🐛, 🦋 Have the students look up the verses listed and complete the missing words. Have them use the letters shown in the circles to write the message at the bottom of the page. Save time for talking about what the verses mean to your students, **GAL05.GF1 & 2.**



A Heart That Loves Others (Craft). 🐛, 🦋 Explain that if we are to love others, our hearts must be filled with the Holy Spirit. Have the students assemble this heart craft according to the instructions, **GAL05.GF2.**

- Find the Special Word (Puzzle).** 🐛, 🦋 Have the students unscramble the words of the memory verse in the box. Then they should use the circled letters to find the missing word and write all the words in the correct order to find today's memory verse, **GAL05.GF3**.
 - How Do I Handle Sin That I See in the Lives of Other Believers? (Discussion).** 🐛, 🦋 What do the students do when they see/hear a believer sin? What examples can the students think of that happened in the past? What does Scripture say we should do (Galatians 6:1-9)? Explain that to truly love someone is not to ignore their sin, but help them to deal with it appropriately. How should the students respond when they have their own sin pointed out? Tell them we should be thankful to others who love us enough to desire to help us with our burden of sin.
 - Love My Neighbors (Game).** 🐛, 🦋 After teaching the memory verse, arrange chairs in a large circle, enough for everyone, minus one. That last person will be a teacher to start in the center explaining the game. Immediately, he or she will recite the memory verse. Following this, he or she will state, "I love my neighbors who..." filling in the end of the sentence with some characteristic (e.g. "...who have brown shoes," or "...who have eaten anchovies before"). Any person sitting in the circle who can affirm this characteristic to be true of themselves must get up and find another vacant seat in the circle that is not adjacent to their own seat. The last person will not find a vacant seat and must recite the memory verse and state the above with a new characteristic. Following the exercise, discuss the kinds of conditions we really do put on this command, thus defining who are neighbors really are. Discuss how Jesus would define our neighbors (i.e. any of those persons whom God has placed in our life's path).
 - Aim Questions (Worksheet).** 🐛 Have the students answer the Aim Questions about today's Bible Adventure, **GAL05.GF4**.
 - Passage Review Questions (Worksheet).** 🐛, 🦋 This booklet contains many questions from the Scripture passage covered in today's lesson. Students may work on them in class and complete them during the week at home, **GAL05.GF5**.
 - Galatians 5:14 (Memory Verse Song).** 🐛 Words and music for today's memory verse are available upon request from Children's Ministry.

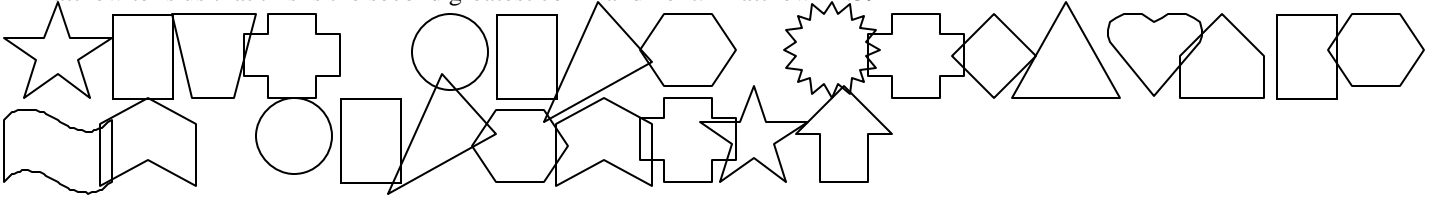
- Love Your Neighbor (Craft).** 🐛, 🦋 Copy **GAL05.GF6** onto cardstock. Have the students color and cut out the hearts, leaving the outside edge of each heart attached. Have helpers cut with a straight edge on the dotted lines of the verses. Next, have the students fold their paper in half and then open the card up so that the verses fold out away from the card and form a pop-out. On the left-hand heart, have the students cut a slit partially through on the right-hand upper corner. On the right-hand heart, have them cut a slit partially through on the left-hand lower corner. Have them hook the two together.
- What Kind of Seeds Are You Sowing? (Craft).** 🐛 Discuss with the students how if we sow or plant the kind of works just to please ourselves, we will reap a harvest of destruction. Our flesh is not eternal, so if we spend our time caring only for it, we will have nothing when we die. But if we sow the kind of works that please God, we will reap eternal benefits. Have the students complete **GAL05.GF7** by coloring the flowers or decorating them with crumpled tissue paper and pasting seeds on the dots. Send this home as a reminder for the students to remember who they are to be serving this coming week.

- Hands Working for God (Craft Completion).** 🍌, 🦋 Paste the drawings of the students' hands that were traced during the HOOK time on another piece of construction paper. Have them cut out the cuffs from **GAL05.GF8**, and trim as necessary to fit, pasting them down in the wrist area of the hands. Have the students cut out the "Fruit of the Spirit" labels and paste one on each of the fingers. Have them paste the remaining labels on the sheet to complete.
- Letter to Leader (Activity/Worksheet).** 🍌, 🦋 Have the students read Galatians 6:6-10. Explain that we should be encouraging our leaders. Have the students use **GAL05.GF9 Pg. 1** for younger students and **GAL05.GF9 Pg. 2** for older students to make a thank-you card for someone who has made a difference in their spiritual life. It can be a teacher, parent, pastor, friend, or whomever they would like. It would be best if they can think of a specific instance to reference in their thank-you card. Ask them to give/mail their thank-you card today.
- What Keeps Us from Helping Others? (Worksheet).** 🍌, 🦋 Explain to the students when we are so self-absorbed that we don't care or even realize that others need our love/help, we are in sin. Use the **GAL05.GF10** to help the students recognize areas in their lives that have been made a selfish priority over loving others as they should.
- Glorify God (Take-Home Page).** 🍌, 🦋 Ask the students if they have ever done good things just because it will make them look good or get them some credit. Explain that this is walking in the flesh. Christ freed us from this wrong motivation to walk in His pure love instead. We have the power to love others as He loves us. Our motivation for doing good things should be strictly to bring glory to God, not ourselves. Have the students cut out the letters from **GAL05.GF11** and paste them onto a sheet of colored paper. Send these home with them and encourage them to write inside the letters this week as they serve others, bringing glory to God.
- Hug Your Leader (Discussion).** 🍌, 🦋 Lead a discussion with the students addressing such questions as: Who are our leaders? How do they love us and carry our burdens? How can we give to them, according to Paul's exhortation? Be prepared to give good answers to these questions after each discussion, and encourage the students to make a specific commitment that shows appreciation to their leaders.

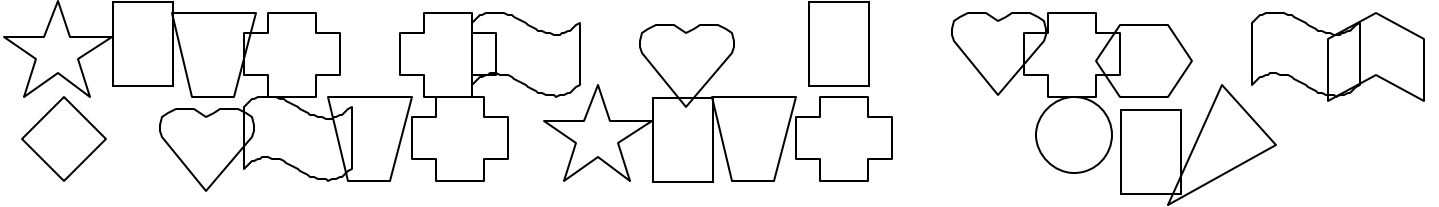
