REVIEW:



Revolving “Re-View” (Stations). Divide up the past 14 lessons of Genesis into stations, combining some lessons into one station if needed. For instance, you can easily combine Lesson 1 & 2, Creation and the Fall. You can also combine all the lessons about Jacob into one review station and all the lessons on Joseph into one station. Assign each teacher, or work in pairs of teachers, to pull together a station. Utilize the pictures, games, worksheets, and/or completed crafts at the station. Give the students enough time to visit each station and review the information covered for that event. Be creative with how you tell the students to move to the next station. Maybe use a gong, a bell, a review song that they all must sing as they transition to the next station or try the ancient call of the thirsty camel. Make each station different (some active, some passive) so the students do not get bored doing the same kinds of things. The objective is to be able to have each student remember the major events well enough that they can tell others. Again, you need to make the stations interesting, interactive, and impacting so that they can remember the information.



Revolving “Re-View” (Craft). Each student will need a duplexed copy of **1GEN15.GF1 Pg. 1 & 2** which has been copied onto white cardstock, two revolving circles (**1GEN15.GF3 Pg. 1**) copied onto colored cardstock, scissors, crayons and a small brad. Have students begin by carefully coloring each of the review pictures on the two wheels. Cut out the circles on **1GEN15.GF3 Pg. 1**. Cut out the windows in each circle. Using a brad, mount these “revolving” wheels directly on top of the review wheels on both sides of the page so that the pictures show through the windows.



Revolving “Re-View” of Genesis (Review/Discussion). Split into small groups, and take turns telling the events that took place from the beginning to the end of Genesis. You may vary this final review by letting each student tell one event or let one student see if they can tell about all of the events. Let the kids help each other remember and fill in the details. What a great tool to share with others!



In the Beginning (Poem). Have students listen as you read this poem to them about God and His creation, **1GEN15.GF2**.

Rainbows (Snack). Make finger Jell-O rainbows.

Materials: One 3oz. package of each of the following Jell-O flavors,

Red - raspberry or strawberry

Orange - orange

Yellow - lemon

Green - lime

Blue - berry blue

Violet - grape

6 packets of unflavored gelatin

Instructions: In separate bowls, combine each package of Jell-O powder with one packet of unflavored gelatin. Add 1¼ cups boiling water to each bowl, and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Pour the grape mixture into a 9 x 13 pan. Refrigerate for about one hour. Continuing in reverse order, pour the other colors into the pan with ½ to 1 hour of refrigeration between each addition. (If mixtures begin to set up in bowls, warm slightly before adding to pan.)

To serve: Cut in long, thin slices and turn pieces on their sides on small paper plates or wax paper. (Do not use paper napkins as they will stick.)

Answer in the Form of a Memory Verse (Q and A Game). Review the 11 memory verses for Genesis, **1GEN15.GF3 Pgs. 1 & 2.** Divide students into two teams. Ask the following questions, and call on the first student to raise their hand. The student must recite the entire verse that contains the answer to the question. Award one point if student attempts the correct verse. Award two points if they recite the verse correctly. (These questions are listed in order for easy elimination in case some verses were not learned by every class. You will want to use them in mixed order.)

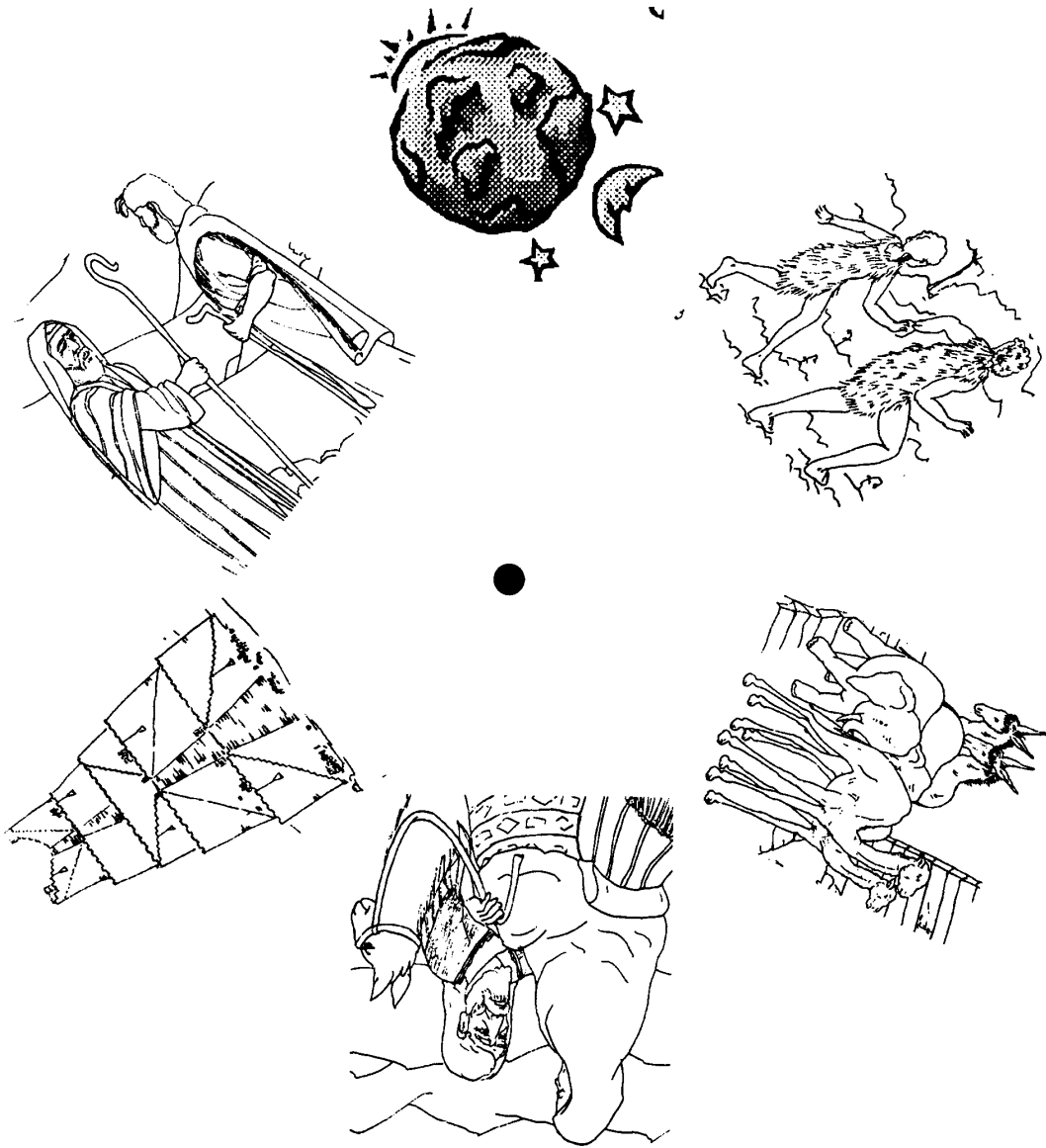

19. Who did Joseph say would give Pharaoh a favorable answer? (Genesis 41:16)
20. How did Joseph comfort his brothers when they were afraid of him? (Genesis 50:19-20)
21. How were God's intentions different from those of Joseph's brothers? (Genesis 50:19-20)
22. What was saved because of God's plan for Joseph's life? (Genesis 50:19-20)

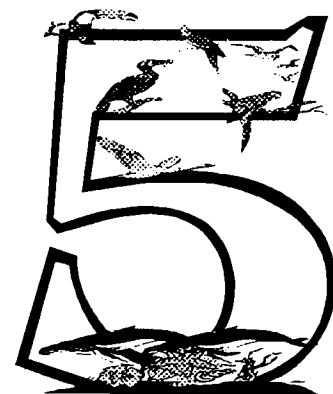
In the Beginning

things that made Joseph cry (Genesis 43:30; 45:15; 50:1)

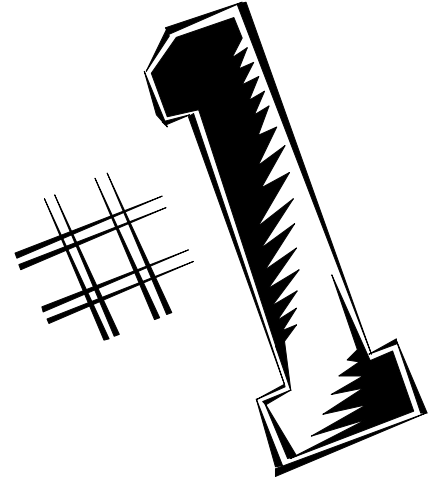
Children, Livestock, Possessions - Jacob's family took them when they
